#### Friday 5th November 2021

It has been a chilly first week back at school with lots of great learning opportunities! The children across the school have been immersing themselves in their new core texts and the teachers have provided exciting 'hook' lessons to get the children excited.

This week, Year 1 have been immersed in their new core text, Island Born. After returning from assembly on Monday, they were transported to the Dominican Republic, which is the main character's home in the story. The children were so excited to look at the artefacts on their tables which had things such as: drums, palm leaves, pictures and flags. Bessie said 'I can't believe our classroom has changed; I wonder what our new book is going to be about'.

After exploring the artefacts, Year 1 watched traditional dancing before joining in and dancing themselves, Carlo loved dancing and hoped 'that our new book has lots of music in it'. The class used all of these items to predict what their new core text is going to be about. Akoma used images from the book to predict, he said 'I predict the little girl lives with her grandma because I can't see her mum and dad.' After looking at images of the main character in school, Ella wondered 'if the little girl has



any friends because she is sitting by herself'. The children will begin reading their new core text next week to see if their predictions were correct. The Year 1 team are looking forward to the amazing writing that the children will do this term.



This week, Year 4 have had an amazing start back after half term. On Monday, they took part in a cricket session, run by experienced coaches, and learnt how to position their bodies to improve their balance when throwing and catching a ball. They had to rely on teamwork to ensure that the ball reaches their partner's hands without hitting the floor.

In English, they began to explore their new core text, Christophe's story and explored the challenges the main character, Christophe, had to face starting a new school as a refugee. Year 4 have also enjoyed learning their new song in Music 'Lean On Me'. They were so supportive of one another that a

few children volunteered to sing the song solo or in a duet to the class, wowing their peers and teachers.

Lucia - I liked learning how to play cricket. I was really happy that I was able to hit the ball both times with the bat and score points for my team.

Madison - I really enjoy singing and I am so proud that I sang in front of the class. I was really nervous but I was happy that Isabella came and sang with me because it didn't make me feel so scared. I'm proud of myself for doing this.



Malachi - I like learning about Christophe in our new book. I really liked acting out scenes from the book and learning what a mime is to help me.



Remembrance Day (Or Poppy Day as it is also known as) is a memorial day observed in the Commonwealth member states since the end of the First World War to honour armed forces members who have died in the line of duty and the vital role played by the emergency services and those that have lost their lives as a result of conflict or terrorism.




Remembrance Day is observed on 11th November each year to recall the end of the First World War hostilities—which ended "at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" in 1918—in accordance with the armistice signed by representatives of Germany and the Entente (the Allies of World War I led

by a coalition of countries such as Britain, France, Russian, Italy, Japan and the United



There are many ways that you can celebrate Remembrance Day and in England we traditionally start with wreath-laying ceremonies at war memorials followed by a two-minute silence observed at 11am on 11th November. You may hear buglers playing 'The Last Post' to mark the start of the two minute silence and then buglers play 'The Rouse' to mark the end. In larger towns and cities you will also hear the firing of field artillery (also known as a gun salute)

In the UK, the main observance is held on Remembrance Sunday, Sunday closest to 11th November and this year falls on Sunday 14th November 2021. There is a National Service of Remembrance held in London (as well as all other regions) attended by representatives of the Crown, the armed forces, civic leaders, ex-servicemen and women, cadet forces, the Scouts, Guides, Boys' Brigade, St Johns Ambulance and the Salvation Army,



The Poppy is a symbol of remembrance and hope for a peaceful future. During the First World War prev ously beautiful countryside everywhere was blasted, bombed and fought over, again and again quickly turn ing the landscape to fields of mud: bleak and barren where nothing could grow. But out of this devastatio the delicate resilient bight red poppies thousand arew As beautifully captured in this poignant poem by Major John McCrae—In Flanders Fields

By wearing a poppy, one shows support for the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces, veterar and their families. Representing all those that lost their lives on active service in all conflicts: from the

beginning of World War I to the present day. It also honours the bution of civilian services and the uniformed services which contribute to national peace and security and acknowledges innocent civilians who have lost their lives in conflict and acts of terrorism.
